What is the ACT?

- The ACT is a national college admission examination that consists of subject areas in: English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science (and an optional Writing Test)
- ACT results are accepted by virtually all U.S. colleges and universities.
- The ACT includes 215 multiple-choice questions:
 - English :75 questions
 - Math: 60
 - Reading: 40
 - Science :40
 - takes around 4 hours to complete with breaks
- In the U.S., the ACT is administered on five national test dates—in September, October, December, February, April, and June.
- ACT is more than a test, it has an interest inventory about career/educational planning and a student profile.



Facts about the ACT

- Highest possible score is 36
- National average for the 2010 ACT was 21.0 and Utah's average was 21.8
- 24,824 or 71% of Utah High School Seniors took the ACT test for the class of 2010
- Scores on the test can help predict grades during the student's first year of college.

What is the difference between the ACT and SAT?

- The ACT is an achievement test, measuring what a student has learned in school. It is curriculum-based. The SAT is more of an aptitude test that examines reasoning and verbal abilities.
- While the ACT has up to 5 components: <u>English, Mathematics, Reading, Science,</u> and an <u>optional Writing Test</u>, the SAT has only 3 components: <u>Verbal, Mathematics,</u> and a required Writing Test.
- The SAT takes off points for wrong answers. The ACT is scored based on the number correct with no correction for guessing.

When should I take the test?

- Many students take the ACT for the 1st time in their junior (11th grade year)., but junior high students can take the test (but it is not recommended)
- It may be helpful to take the test more than once. ACT research shows that of the students who took the ACT more than once:
 - 55% increased their Composite score
 - 22% had no change in their Composite score
 - 23% decreased their Composite score
- Pick a test date that is at least two months ahead of the application deadlines of all the colleges and scholarship agencies you might want to apply to. It typically takes four to eight weeks after a test date to receive your score reports.
- There is no limitation on how many times, but you can only take it once per state test date.



ACT Fees

- All fees are nonrefundable unless otherwise noted.
- \$ 35.00 Basic registration fee for the ACT (includes reports for you, your high school, and up to 4 colleges requested at registration)
- \$50.50 for ACT test including optional writing test
- There are Late Fees and additional charges to test date/center change, standby testing, and sending your scores to more than 4 colleges




Helpful Hints for Test Day

- Be Early (usually by 8 AM)
- Bring Admissions ticket and have Acceptable Identification
 - which are: driver's license, published individual photo, notarized statement with photo or passport, and school letter or transcript. <u>School IDs are Not</u> <u>acceptable</u>.
- Have permitted calculator
- Carefully Read Instructions and questions
- Pace self
- Use No. 2 Pencil
- Answer easy questions first, then go back and answer more difficult ones
- On difficult questions, eliminate as many incorrect answers as you can, then make an educated guess among those remaining.
- Mark answers neatly, if you erase, erase completely



Colleges use ACT results in a variety of ways:

- Admission decisions (i.e. Admissions index)
- Course placement (i.e.in freshman classes)
- Academic advising
- Scholarships and loans (i.e. competitive for scholarship due to scores.)

* The Admissions Index is used as a guide by all of the four-year public universities in the state of Washington, but is not the only factor considered. Cumulative GPA is approximately three times as important as test scores in determining the Admissions Index. ACT and SAT are not equivalent tests, but the formula uses this approximate conversion chart to calculate Admissions Index.



Sample Question on the ACT

If 5a = 25, then a2 = ? A. 5 B. 20 C. 25 D. 125 E. 625




The correct answer is C. 5a = 25 so a = 5; $a2 = 5 \cdot 5 = 25$


- A. If a2 = 5, then a = and 5a = 5 = 25 so a2 5.
- B. If a2 = 20, then a = and
 5a = 5 = 25 so a2 20.
- D. If a2 = 125, then a = and 5a = 5 = 25 so a2 125.
- E. If a2 = 625, then a = = 25 and 5a = 5(25) = 125 25 so a2 625.



Example: Brigham Young University (home.byu.edu)


- It should be noted that the December ACT test is the last test date which will be evaluated for summer or fall admission.
- As a reference point, the average ACT for an incoming freshman at BYU is a 28.1 (note: ACT score is only one factor of many considered in the admissions decision). Avg. SAT score is 1240
- Because BYU considers only your highest composite scores, you should consider taking the ACT/SAT multiple times. Studies show that students who retake the ACT/SAT have a **57 percent chance** of increasing their previous score by 1 to 3 points.
- Be sure to take the ACT/SAT at the beginning of your junior year so that you can take it again before October of your senior year.
