## 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Course Descriptions

### **Required Classes**

English 8: This course continues to develop students' skills in reading (literature and informational texts), writing (informational and argument texts), speaking, listening, and grammar.

English 8 ALL: This project-based class requires above grade-level reading, writing, and thinking skill. Prior approval is required based on district testing.

# Math placement is based on teacher recommendation:

Intermediate Math 2: This course focuses on deepening students' understanding of algebra including an introduction to functions, expanding number systems to include irrational numbers, and building on geometry concepts introduced in Intermediate 1.

Intermediate Math 2 with Lab: By teacher recommendation only. Concepts are pre-taught in the lab for the regular math class. Students are accountable for positive behaviors. Preparation, participation, attendance and punctuality are required. Daily class.

<u>Secondary Math 1 Honors:</u> For 8th grade students who have successfully completed 7<sup>th</sup> grade Accelerated Math class. Students will be integrated into the 9<sup>th</sup> grade Secondary 1 classes.

Integrated Science 8<sup>th</sup>: Students will explore the relationship between matter and energy in this hands-on and interactive course. Chemistry, Physics, Ecology, and Earth Science are woven together to tell the story of how matter and energy explain the natural phenomena we see in the world around us.

<u>US History:</u> This course covers events and issues from the Age of Exploration through Reconstruction and the western movement, emphasizing the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries. Topics will include exploration, colonization, the Revolutionary War, constitutional issues, nation building, the Civil War, Reconstruction, and the western movement.

<u>Health:</u> This course is designed to inform students about themselves and their surroundings. It covers hygiene, mental health, circulatory system, respiratory system, first aid (DPR), substance abuse, physical fitness, and other related areas.

8<sup>th</sup> Grade PE: Skills and techniques in a variety of team and individual sports will be taught. Running and exercise skills are taught to improve physical fitness.

### **Elective Courses**

Art Foundations 1: Introduction to visual arts and basic design concepts while building skills through various mediums and fun projects. \$10.00 fee.

Art Foundations 2: Further exploration of the visual arts and mediums, while building meaningful content through fun, culturally and artistically diverse projects. \$10.00 fee.

Intro to Drawing: Exploring and building basic drawing skills and design concepts through fun projects and mediums. \$10.00 fee.

<u>Drawing 1:</u> Intermediate course for improving and developing drawing skills through various techniques and mediums. Focus is mainly on black and white drawing. \$15.00 fee

<u>3D Design/Crafts 1:</u> Exploration of 3 D art and basic design through various cultural folk arts, including fun paper and fabric arts projects. \$20.00 fee

3D Design: Crafts 2: Prerequisite: Crafts 1. Builds on the skill sets learned in Crafts 1 while exploring more fun 3-D projects. \$20.00 fee

<u>Digital Photography:</u> Includes the inventive use of light, photographic equipment and the computer to create photographic works of art. There is an emphasis on the use of the computer to edit works of art. This course is designed to develop higher-level thinking, art-related technology skill, art critics, art history, and aesthetics. Prerequisite: Art Foundations 1 or 2. \$10.00 fee

Digital Photography II: Students will build on their picture taking skills, and learn and apply enhanced photo editing skills. Students will work on self-directed projects to help build a portfolio. Prerequisite: Completion of Digital Photo I with a C or higher grade. \$10.00 fee

Art 2D: Animation: Exploration of the history and techniques of early animation through basic drawing and animation projects. \$10.00 fee

<u>Ceramics 1:</u> Develops basic skills in the creation of 3D forms and pottery from clays. With an emphasis on studio production, this course is designed to develop higher-level thinking, art-related technology skill, art criticism, art history, and aesthetics. \$20.00 fee

Ceramics 2: Applies the basic skills learned in Beginning Ceramics to create three-dimensional works of art of higher quality with an introduction the potter's wheel. With an emphasis on studio production, this course is designed to develop higher-level thinking, art-related technology skills, art criticism, art history, and aesthetics. Prerequisite: Ceramics 1 \$20.00 fee

Band-Beginning: Students will learn to perform on a wind instrument of their choice. Students will learn to read music with an emphasis on good tone quality and intonation, as well as rhythmic accuracy. Summer band is strongly recommended. Instrument required. \$6.00 fee

**Symphonic Band:** The first of two audition concert bands. Symphonic band students are expected to know all 12 major scales, play with a clear focused tone with good intonation, and play advanced rhythmic figures. Instrument required. \$50.00 fee

Advanced Wind Symphony: Students are expected to know all 12 major scales, as many two octave scales as possible and to play with a clear focused

They are also expected to know the 12 minor scales and play advanced rhythmic figures. Instrument required. \$50.00 fee

Jazz Band: This early morning audition band consists of some of the finest musicians at Canyon View. They will learn the art of solo improvisation within the following styles: rock, swing, ballad, funk reggae and Latin. Instrument required.

<u>Guitar 1:</u> Students will learn basic skills of chording, note-reading, and rhythms. Students must have their own acoustic Guitar.

Orchestra-Beginning: Designed for students who have had little or no previous experience playing violin, viola, cello, or string bass, but would like to learn. School instruments are available upon request. \$10.00 fee

Orchestra-Intermediate: Designed for violin, viola, cello, or string bass students who have successfully completed Beginning Orchestra. Students audition for placement in this class. School instruments are available upon request. \$20.00 fee

<u>Orchestra-Advanced:</u> Designed for violin, viola, cello, or string bass students who have successfully

completed Intermediate Orchestra. Students audition for placement in this upper-level Orchestra class. School instruments are available upon request. \$20.00 fee

### Ladies' Chorus, Men's Chorus:

Introduction to proper vocal technique, performing, music history, and reading music. Students will be exposed to different languages, physical expression, and a wide variety of musical styles. \$5.00 fee per semester

Chorus SSA-Treble Trios: This audition women's choir continues the development of proper vocal technique, provides more performance opportunities, and will focus on learning to read music at a more advanced level. Students may also experience elements of composing and arranging, as well as movement through music. Fees as high as \$30 may apply, these are itemized and will depend on individual needs. Students may apply for fee waivers or speak with Miss Sanders if there is a financial obstacle.

Chorus Audition- Bravo: This audition mixed choir continues the development of proper vocal technique, provides more performance opportunities, and will focus on learning to read music at a more advanced level. Students may also experience elements of composing and arranging, as well as movement through music. Fees as high as \$30.00 may apply, these are itemized and will depend on individual needs. Students may apply for fee waivers or speak with Miss Sanders if there is a financial obstacle.

Theater Arts is a comprehensive study of the theater including set and lighting design, costume design, properties, musical theater, and the history of the theater. Students are introduced to basic acting principles such as pantomime, storytelling, scene work, improvisation and monologues. We will discuss audition techniques and basic public speaking.

#### FACS Sewing/Interior Design/Fashion:

Introduction to basic sewing skills construction techniques, machine maintenance, textiles, clothing care, social and financial skills, housing and interior design. Additional materials are required to be supplied by the student. \$5.00 fee

#### FACS Foods/Nutrition/Marketing:

Provides students the opportunity to learn essential life skills. Allows them to develop skills in food and nutrition, childcare and safety, and consumerism. Basic cooking and food preparation skills are emphasized. \$5.00 fee

#### Exploring Technology is a

comprehensive, project-based course that introduces students to the many types of technology. Students will develop problem-solving skills and apply them to structural and mechanical systems, electronics, manufacturing, and digital communications. (STEM). \$5.00 fee

<u>Creative Writing:</u> This course is intended for beginning and more advanced writers looking to improve writing skills. The focus will be on creative non-fiction, poetry and short stories, Students are expected to write and share their work.

Reading Literature: Students will analyze a variety of short stories and novels. Students will also learn about various reading strategies. This class is designed so that readers of all levels can learn about various genres in literature and gain practical strategies to improve individual reading skills and become better independent readers.

Spanish 1: Students will be introduced to the foreign language and pronunciation as they work through five units centered around:
Greetings/Introductions,
Physical/Personality Descriptions,
Pastimes and City Locations, School, and Family. Students will be able to use some memorized, repetitive words, lists and phrases to provide basic information as well as ask and answer simple, memorized questions on very familiar topics.

Spanish 2: Students will continue their exposure to the Spanish language as they work through five units centered around: Clothing and Weather, Home and Daily Routine, Healthy Eating, Hobbies and Interests, and Getting Around Town. Students will be able to use sentences to provide basic information and will start to create simple sentences on their own. They will also be able to ask and answer simple questions on very familiar topics.

Spanish 3: In level 3, students can satisfy routine social demands and limited work requirements. They can state and support opinions as well as exchange information. They can comprehend and respond to written communication. In speaking and writing, they can narrate, describe and explain in past, present, and future.

Spanish 4: In level 4 language, students begin a cycle of advanced understanding and performance in the language. They can exchange personal opinions for the purpose of persuading others. They can use a variety of language strategies, and they can read and write factual information accurately. They read excerpts of literature. They discuss and respond to what they read.

French 1: Students will be introduced to the French language and pronunciation as they work through five units centered around:
Greetings/Introductions,
Physical/Personality Descriptions,
Pastimes and City Locations, Family and School. Students will be able to use some memorized, repetitive words, lists and phrases to provide basic information as well as ask and answer simple, memorized questions on very familiar topics.

French 2: Students will continue their exposure to the French language as they work through five units centered around: Clothing and Weather, the Home and Daily Routine, Healthy Eating, Hobbies and Interests, and Past activities. Students will be able to use

phrases and short sentences to provide basic information and will start to create simple sentences on their own. They will also be able to ask and answer simple questions on very familiar topics.

<u>Chinese Immersion: This</u> is a continuation of the immersion program. Chinese language and culture will be covered in this course.

<u>Spanish Immersion:</u> This course will focus on continuing language development. The class is supplemented by a one-semester culture class; expanding their understanding of history and culture.

Sports Skills: This class is designed for student athletes who want to improve skills and strategies of team sports, including learning new skills for various sports. This course will include skill instruction and implementation into a competitive game and team setting. Students will learn the value of working in a team setting, overcoming obstacles, and playing together. Sports may include, but are not limited to: basketball, flag football, soccer, ultimate frisbee, pickleball, badminton, baseball/softball, and volleyball.

<u>Peer Tutor:</u> Students will be trained to assist students with special needs to learn and practice academic, social skills, life skills and appropriate behavior.

Aide-Teacher, or Media: Students help teacher or office staff with a variety of assignments. Teacher approval, 3.0 GPA, good citizenship and attendance are required.

Yearbook: \$5.00 fee. Student Council: \$150.00 fee Students in grades 7 and 8 must earn a minimum of 14 credits to receive a Completion Certificate at the end of the 8<sup>th</sup> grade.

These must include 2 Math, 2 English, 1.5 History, 1 PE, .5 health, 1 CCA, 2 Science, .5 Digital Lit and elective credits.
