WHAT CAN I DO NOW TO START PREPARING FOR BYU?

New freshmen are high school or home school graduates with no college credit or with college credit completed prior to high school graduation. Students who are high school age and will not be completing high school are also considered new freshmen.

Comprehensive Admission Review (What we look at...)

Every new freshman applicant undergoes the following review process:

- The first consideration in the review process is the ecclesiastical endorsement. Each applicant must be
 endorsed by his or her ecclesiastical leaders as one who is worthy to attend BYU and is living in harmony with
 the Honor Code and the Dress and Grooming Standards (<u>BeSmart.com/honorcode</u>). Applicants who are not
 members of the LDS Church must be interviewed by either their own ecclesiastical leader or an LDS bishop in
 addition to the university chaplain.
- 2. Each student's academic record—consisting of high school GPA and ACT/SAT scores—is then considered as the foundation and central focus of admission decisions. However, BYU is looking for students who are accomplished in a variety of areas—not just academics. **Thus, a certain GPA or ACT score alone does not guarantee admission.** Currently, BYU does not require the ACT Writing Test. The admissions committee will, however, pay particular attention to applicants' writing ability as demonstrated by the essay portion of the admission application.
- 3. Each application is then reviewed and evaluated according to the following elements: **seminary attendance**, **service**, **leadership**, **personal essays**, **individual talents**, **creativity**, **AP/IB courses taken**, **unique or special circumstance**s, and other factors showing a student's ability to strengthen the BYU community.

College Prep Checklist

- Live the standards of the LDS Church
- Attend and graduate from LDS seminary
- Enroll in quality coursework (recommendations)
 - Four years of mathematics
 - o Four years of **English**
 - Two to three years of laboratory science
 - Two years of history or government
 - Two or more years of foreign language
- Take ACT/SAT in junior year and again the fall of senior year (recommended)
- Get involved with extracurricular activities
- Keep in mind the cost—save money!
- Be mindful of deadlines
