FEEDBACK FOR 2025-2026 AT OAK CANYON

There are a few items we would love to gather some parent feedback about concerning items for the 2025-2026 school year. They are:

1. School Start and End Times

Currently, Oak Canyon and Canyon View are the only two junior high/middle schools in Alpine School District that start at 7:45 and end at 2:15. This has been because it is the only way that the ASD Transportation Department can provide bus routes to all qualifying students in our area. However, due to some changes being made to bus routes effective next school year for secondary students, we have the opportunity to change our start and end times 30 minutes later and move into alignment with the other junior high/middle schools. Canyon View is considering this change as well. Some might be concerned that students would no longer be able to do school to school with classes at the high school if our bell schedule does not align with the high schools; however, all junior highs/middle schools in the district that start at 8:15 have found a way to do school to school with their feeder high schools that start at 7:45. A while back we surveyed our students about ways we could improve our school. One of the top responses from the students was to start school later. Research indicates that for adolescent students, it is better for them to start school later. That said, we would like parent feedback to be part of our decision making process. If we make the change, school will start at 8:15 each day and will end at 2:45 on M, Tu, Th, and F and at 1:45 on Wednesdays.

2. Bark

Bark is a system that alerts the school and parents about concerning content created by students in their Google suite of tools (Google Docs, Google Slides, Google Sheets, Google Chat). This is content that is violent, profane,

and/or sexual in nature. When concerning content is detected, administrators and parents can receive a notification. Our administrative team receives many of these daily. While a few valid concerns have been detected, over all, there have been many alerts in error. For example, if a student is writing about a war in their history class and talks about weapons, fighting, casualties, etc., their work is flagged for violent content, when there is nothing of actual concern. Some parents and students have expressed concerns that Bark is a violation of privacy. We have the opportunity to decide if we would like to use Bark again next year. Again, we do not want to make this decision without parent input.

3. Cell Phones

This year PGHS has implemented a strict cell phone policy. The policy requires students to put their phones on airplane mode when they enter a classroom and to place their phones in a cell phone caddy for the duration of the class period. Students have been allowed to use their phones during class breaks and at lunch. We have been told that Timpanogos High School will be implementing this policy next year as well. As a junior high that feeds both of those high schools, we feel that our approach to cell phones needs to be at a minimum the same as the high schools. We are considering even more robust measures. We are aware that some students need access to their phones due to medical apps and monitoring facilitated by their phones. We would obviously have some way to address that. Ultimately, our concern is the constant distraction and disruption that cell phones cause to our students' learning and the overall learning environment. We absolutely need parent support in implementing this kind of change in our school next year. We would love your input!

Posters will be posted on the windows at the Finance and Office with student ID's of those who have bought one. Please have your student verify.

Student Fees/Fines: Student fees are due **NOW**. Fines will be given on May 15th for any school property that has not been returned or has been damaged. Students who have not paid their fees or fines by yearbook day will NOT receive their yearbook that day. Please avoid the LONG line on yearbook day by paying for fees now, helping your student get their stuff turned in, and taking care of any fines as soon asap. The Finance Office will NOT be taking calls on yearbook day due to long lines at the window. Remaining balances that are left after May 30th will be turned over to our collection company.

Lagoon: Lagoon is coming up for our 9th graders on **Tuesday, May 20th**. Information is on our **school website**. Parents or Guardians need to fill out the permission form FIRST then they can pay online at myschoolfees or at the finance window. Your student will not be able to go unless we have a permission form for them.


